Riverside State Park: Spokane's Backyard Jewel

featuring Spokane Audubon's Kim Thorburn



 \mathbf{R} iverside State Park, right in Spokane's backyard, offers outstanding year-round bird watching. Join us on January 13th for Spokane Audubon member Kim Thorburn's presentation about the park's diverse ecosystems and the birding opportunities they afford.

Kim is a frequent park visitor who has developed a list of more than 150 bird species sightings, including several on the state's watch list. In addition to many wonderful recreational activities, Riverside State Park provides important habitat conservation for wildlife. Kim expects that many of you may be surprised at some of the bird sightings.

Kim is a former president of Spokane Audubon Society who leads several field trips and participates in other activities to promote bird watching and wildlife conservation. She assists Gary Blevins with Spokane Audubon's "Learn to Bird" workshops held in conjunction with International Migratory Bird Day. She is a member of the Washington State Fish and Wildlife Commission.

Spokane Audubon Society Field Trips

The following list shows field trips planned by the Spokane Audubon Society. Trips may be added with short notice so check the website often. Call for Volunteers: Waterfowl Survey

Ducks Unlimited, Turnbull NWR and WDFW are starting a Channelled Scablands Spring Waterfowl Survey effort to finally put some numbers on how important the Scablands are to migrating waterfowl. The current plan involves both aerial and ground surveys from mid-February through mid-April. Aerial surveys will be done every two weeks, and ground surveys every week to catch any pulses of birds that might be missed between aerial surveys. Spokane Audubon will be assisting with the ground surveys in Reardan. This information will be important for future planning and it's a great way to give purpose to your birding outings! Some advanced birders might find the trips geared toward beginning birders too basic and slow-paced. Some trips last five or six hours; some are 12 hours or longer. Read the trip descriptions carefully to see if a trip is right for you.

2016 Field Trip Schedule

January 23, 2016, Saturday LC Valley Banana Belt Trip Leader: Keith Carlson

This all-day trip is geared toward all levels of birders. The Lewiston/Clarkston (LC) Valley often has slightly more moderate temperatures in winter, which can make for some great winter birding. We will meet Walmart in Pullman at 8:00 a.m. Come prepared for winter weather, bring snacks, water, and lunch. Contact Tom Light at tlight3@gmail.com or by phone at 509-638-2274 by January 20 to register for the trip.

Note: This trip will be dependent on weather and road conditions.

Target Species: A variety of waterfowl (hopeful target: Long-tailed Duck), winter gulls, including hopeful Lesser Black-backed and Thayer's, Black-crowned Night-Herons, chaseable Snowy Owl and/or Gyrfalcon (if reported), wintering warblers, sparrows, and finches

February 6, 2016, Saturday Snowy Owl Trip Leaders: Fran and Brad Haywood

This trip is geared toward all levels of birders. We will spend most of the day exploring the area around Reardan and Davenport, and perhaps drive down Mill Canyon or to Coffee Pot Lake area depending on the latest bird reports. Winter birding can be slow and there are no guarantees. Weather can be a major factor.. We will meet at

Spokane's Coeur d'Alene Park at 7:30 a.m. Contact Fran at 484-8666, or *birders13@gmail.com* by January 31 if you plan to attend.

Target Species: Rough-legged and Red-tailed Hawks, Prairie Falcon, Snowy Owl, Short-eared Owl, Northern Shrike, Snow Buntings, Lapland Longspur, Gray Partridge

March 19, 2016, Saturday Bluebird Trip Leader: Marian Frobe

This is a family friendly half-day trip and a great way to greet spring. We'll drive a route on Paradise Prairie to see returning favorite birds. We probably will finish at Turnbull National Wildlife Refuge. The trip usually ends around 2 p.m. We will meet at Spokane's Coeur d'Alene Park at 7:00 a.m. Call leader Marian Frobe at 328-0621 by March 15, if you plan to attend.

Target Species: Migrant ducks and geese, raptors, woodpeckers, Say's Phoebe, Western Bluebird

March 26, 2016, Saturday Turnbull NWR Beginning Birder Basics Trip Leader: Fran Haywood

This is a half-day driving and walking trip for all levels of birders, and is family oriented. It is early in the season for many species, but always exciting to see what has arrived. Meet at the refuge headquarters near Cheney at 7 a.m. Contact leader Fran Haywood, 484-8666, birders13@gmail.com by March 20 if you plan to attend.

Note: We will have a group pass to cover the refuge entrance fee.

Target Species: Breeding waterfowl, Tundra and Trumpeter Swans; Great Blue Heron, Red-tailed Hawk, woodpeckers; Pygmy, Red-breasted, and White-breasted Nuthatch, Western Bluebird, Song Sparrow, Red-winged and Yellow-headed Blackbird, Red Crossbill

April 16, 2016, Saturday Sprague Lake Field Trip Leader: Fran Haywood

This is a half-day trip to the Sprague Lake area, open to all birders. We will look for migrating and early resident species, especially ducks. We may drive through Miller Ranch, stop at Sprague Cemetery, and Cow Lake. We hope to find Swainson's Hawks, American White Pelicans, and if we get lucky, Long-billed Curlew. We will meet at Spokane's Coeur d'Alene Park at 6:30 a.m. Contact Fran Haywood (484-8666, birders13@gmail.com) by April 10 if you plan to attend.

Target Species: Migrant ducks and geese, American White Pelican, Swainson's Hawk, American Avocet, Black-necked Stilt, Caspian Tern, Say's Phoebe, Yellow-rumped Warbler, White-crowned and Savannah Sparrows, and Long-billed Curlew

April 21-26, 2016, Thursday-Tuesday Point Reyes, California Field Trip Leader: Kim Thorburn Limit: 6 Birders

This six-day trip is for intermediate and advanced birders. Kim Thorburn will provide lodging for up to six participants and lead field trips on Bolinas Lagoon and beach, Point Reyes Bird Observatory, Point Reyes National Seashore, Mt. Tamalpais State Park, and the Marin Headlands. This region is a year-round birding hot spot, site of the filming of Alfred Hitchcock's "The Birds," and home of elite birder and artist Keith Hansen. There is a variety of pelagic and other waterfowl, migrating shorebirds and warblers, and lots of land natives that we don't often see here. Participants will be responsible for their own air travel to Oakland and we'll split the cost of land transportation and food. We'll need to coordinate arrival and departure in Oakland. April 30, 2016, Saturday West Plains Early Migrant Trip Leader: Alan McCoy Limit: 15 Birders

This all-day trip is for all levels of birders. We will stop at Reardan's Audubon Lake where we will look for waterfowl and shorebirds. We will check out the Davenport Cemetery, which can be great for migrants. Then we will go north to the Little Falls Dam and follow the Spokane River upstream and finish up at the Indian Canyon Springs area. We will meet at 6:00 a.m. at the Rosauer's parking lot in Browne's Addition (near 2nd Avenue and Sunset Highway) and plan to return about 6:00 p.m. Contact leader Alan McCoy at 448-3123, 448-8861 or ahm2352@ gmail.com by April 25 to reserve your place.

May 9, 11, 13 Monday, Wednesday, Friday evenings Bird Identification Workshop Leaders: Gary Blevins and Kim Thorburn

May 21, 2016, Saturday Peone Praries Wetlands Trip Leaders: Ann Brinly, Jim and Bea Harrison

All levels of birders are welcome to join us for a half-day walking trip along the Little Spokane River Natural Area. This is the peak of breeding season. Over 80 species have been recorded in this rich riparian, forest, and rock habitat. June 4, 2016, Saturday Liberty Lake Trip Leader: Joyce Alonso and Brian Miller

This is a mostly easy walking half-day trip. Liberty Lake hosts some of the best habitat diversity in Spokane County, with breeding grebes on the lake, extensive wetlands and prairie, old second-growth Ponderosa pine, and some of the best wetbelt mixed conifer forest in the area. Contact Joyce Alonso (448-2447) by May 31 if you plan to attend.

Target Species: Red-necked Grebe, Wilson's Snipe, Virginia and Sora Rails, woodpeckers, Hammond's, Dusky, and Willow Flycatcher, Cassin's, Warbling, and Red-eyed Vireos, Marsh Wren, Yellow, MacGillvray's, Orangecrowned, Townsend's, and Nashville Warblers, American Redstart, Common Yellowthroat

June 5, 2016, Sunday Mount Spokane Subalpine Birds Trip Leader: Jim Hudlow

This is a half-day hiking trip for all levels of birders. The grade is very gentle but we will walk four to six miles. Be prepared with plenty of snacks and water. You may retreat at any point. Mt. Spokane is the primary (and only publicly accessible) site for subalpine breeding birds in Spokane County, making this a popular and exciting annual event. Target Species: Dusky and Ruffed Grouse, accipiters, Northern Pygmy Owl, woodpeckers, Hammond's Flycatcher, Warbling and Cassin's Vireos, Gray and Stellar's Jays, Chestnutbacked Chickadee, Swainson's, Hermit, and Varied Thrushes, Yellow-rumped and Townsend's Warblers, Fox Sparrow, Cassin's Finch, Red Crossbill

June 11, 2016, Saturday Iller Creek Trip Leader: Gary Lee

This trip is for birders of all levels as well as local citizens who want to learn more about protecting our precious Dishman Hills ecosystem. On this trip, we will slowly walk some of the trails and see what is there. The Iller Creek Natural Area is famed for its abundance of breeding flycatchers, vireos, and warblers. Occasionally a moose makes a cameo appearance! Meet at the Iller Creek entrance in the cul-de-sac at the end of Holman Road. All levels of birders are invited to explore the Indian Canyon area immediately west of town. We will be walking one or two miles. September 10, 2016 Saturday Sprague Lake Migrant Trip Leader: Norma Trefry

This is a half day trip to the Sprague Lake area to look for migrating birds, and birds which often stray here in September. Meet at Coeur d'Alene Park at 6:15 a.m. We will leave the park at 6:30 a.m. There will be a \$5.00 charge per person if we bird at either of the private resorts on the lake. This is a beginning, intermediate and advanced birder-oriented trip to look for specialty birds, such as Arctic Gulls, Lapland Longspurs, and other hard-to-find-and-see northern visitors. There may be some down time with little action in between bird sightings but potential for rarities is high. It is a full-day trip from sunrise to sunset. November 19, 2016, Saturday Douglas Plateau Northern Visitors Trip Leader: Kim Thorburn

The Waterville Plateau is a challenging but high-quality destination for rarities during the late fall and winter months. We will work the rolling steppe of the Plateau in search of unusual raptors, owls, and passerines; we'll also bird along the Columbia River in hopes of finding rare Arctic Gulls and saltwater waterfowl, such as scoters, Long-tailed Duck, and Pacific Loon. We will spend the night of November 18 in Brewster for an earlier start with the birds during this short daylight season. Contact Kim Thorburn (465-3025 or kthorburn@msn.com) by November 14 if you plan to attend.

Note: This trip will be dependent on weather and road conditions.

Target Species: Loons and grebes; scoters and rare wintering waterfowl; wintering raptors; Glaucous, Thayer's, and Glaucous-winged Gulls; Snowy Owl; Northern Shrike; Snow Bunting; Lapland Longspur; Gray-crowned Rosy Finch. We will hunt for elusive rarities, including Gyrfalcon and Northern Hawk Owl

December 10, 2016, Saturday Coeur d' Alene area Eagles Leader: TBD

This trip takes us around Beauty Bay on Lake Coeur d'Alene where the Bald Eagles feeding on spawned out salmon are always a sight to behold. Weather permitting, those interested may drive down to the Thompson Lake/Harrison region where a variety of birds winter in a slightly warmer zone. Probable particulars: 8:00 a.m. start at Liberty Lake Albertson's parking lot.

Note: This trip will be dependent on weather and road conditions.

Target Species: Bald Eagles, several duck and grebe species. Possibles, seen

Chihuahuan Raven, Black-crested
Titmouse, Long-billed Thrasher, Audubon and Altimira Oriole, Great-tailed
Grackle and Roadrunner.

Many years we find vagrants from Mexico spending some time in the Valley. Crimson-collared Grosbeak, Greycrowned Yellowthroat, Rose-throated Becard, Bare-throated Tiger-heron, Elegant Trogon and Blue Mockingbird have all been sighted on various trips.
