

Join us on Wednesday, November 13th, for a program featuring Columbia Riverkeeper's Hanford Coordinator, Theresa Labriola. Her presentation will focus on the troubling relationship Hanford has with the Columbia River. Historically, Hanford has discharged contaminated wastewater directly into the Columbia, resulting in its designation as the most radioactive river in the United States. Hanford's pollution didn't just run downstream, it affected the fish, wildlife and communities that rely on the river.

Theresa will detail Hanford's dirty history and the current state of disrepair of the cleanup. She will talk about the continuing impact of Hanford waste on the Columbia River, its surrounding communities and wildlife. She will touch on what Riverkeeper is doing to stop further contamination of the Columbia River by Hanford, and what we can do to help.



Theresa Labriola has an extensive background in advocacy, pursuing legal and grassroots solutions to environmental pollution and the over-exploitation of our natural resources. As an environmental litigator, she prosecuted lawsuits against some of the worst polluters of our air and water. Before joining Riverkeeper, Theresa worked on a campaign to protect our oceans by protecting forage fish, an important link in the marine food chain.

# **Sights & Sounds**

# Bird Sightings for the Inland Northwest by Cindy McCormack

There always seems to be a few lulls in bird activity in October—I consider those the doldrums of the birding world. But things are picking up! The ducks are back to looking normal, are plentiful, and usually have something fun mixed in the rafts! The 'odd' gulls (for those that enjoy them!) and other winter birds are arriving. I've already had my first Rough-legged Hawk (early-October) of the season (welcome back!). Soon we will be hearing about the first Snowy Owls and Gyrfalcons…

### **Interesting Sightings for October**

Common Loons are frequently found on our large bodies of water in the fall and winter, but occasionally we get some more unusual loons: Lake Chatcolet Marina (off of Hwy 5 near St. Maries, ID) had an immature **Red-Throated Loon** with the Common Loons (CL), and a juvenile **Pacific Loon** was reported at Spring Valley Reservoir near Moscow, ID (TG).

We are so used to seeing our typical Canada Geese, it is always a great treat to see the others! A **Ross's Goose** was visiting the ponds at 57th & Palouse Hwy Spokane's South Hill (JI); **Snow Geese** have been reported at Sprague Lake (>50) (MC), (102) (JI); Reardan, and Mann Lake (KC). **Greater White-fronted Geese** have been seen at several locations, including Philleo Lake (CW); Mann Lake, Lewiston, ID (KC). Although I don't have the late fall migrant trip report yet, I'm sure they also located some of these geese!

Scoters are here! These sea ducks are always fun to pick out of a duck "scan"! **SURF SCOTERS** have been seen at Deer Lake (JI); Lake Cocolalla (CL); Potlatch (CS); Mill Canyon (JI); north end of Silver Lake (near Medical Lake) (TO); Sprague Lake (27) (JI); Newman Lake, WA (TL); four at TwoRivers (Walla Walla Co.)MMD; Mann Lake, Lewiston, ID (KC); and Central Ferry (4) (MMD). A **WHITE-WINGED SCOTER** was found at Chief Timothy Park, Clarkston (DJ).

A single **HARLEQUIN DUCK** was recorded at Soap Lake (MY).

An adult **THAYER'S GULL** has been reported at Swallows Park in Clarkston, which seems to be a fairly reliable location for them in the winter months. **BONAPARTE'S GULLS** have been seen across river from the Clarkston grain terminal (MC), at Swallows Park(KC), Mann Lake (KC); and Sprague Lake. Lake Coeur d'Alene should start having a greater diversity of gulls soon!

Oh, I was sorry to miss this one! A **PARASITIC JAEGER** was reported at Potholes (MY) in early October. It's always fun to find these guys away from the ocean. (There's much less seasickness involved, too! Hahaha!)

Among the few shorebirds still being reported have been

**BLACK-BELLIED PLOVER** at Sprague Lake (JI) and Mann Lake (2) (KC).

A Dark-morph **FERRUGINOUS HAWK** was identified by Palouse Audubon trip participants along Hwy 23 east of Steptoe, WA (MC).

Keep and eye (and ear) out for these guys! **BLUE JAY** reports seem to becoming more frequent each fall! Sightings have come from Genesee, ID (2) ND, Palouse Falls State Park (BB); Lyons Ferry Park (CR); Spokane County near Cheney (GF); Lewiston, ID (ND); Harrison, ID (TG); UI Arboretum, Moscow, ID (JW); and Tubbs Hill, Coeur d'Alene, ID (MH).

A lovely **Anna's HummingBird** has been recorded visiting the yard of the Cashens in Veradale, WA (MaC/BC).

Check those blackbird flocks carefully! You never know if you might find something like the **RUSTY BLACKBIRD** found near Oden Bay (north shore of Lake Pend Oreille, ID) (CL).

WHITE-THROATED SPARROWS have been seen at the confluence of Spokane/Little Spokane River (TL); Hayden, ID (DW), and at Kootenai NWR (JI). An even more unusual find was a HARRIS'S SPARROW hanging out with a flock of White-crowned Sparrows at Central Ferry (MFM). A GOLDEN-CROWNED SPARROW was found with the White-crowneds along Countryman Rd near St. John, WA (RJB); and along Mill Canyon (JI). Make sure to check those White-crowned Sparrow flocks closely for these other sparrows!

**AMERICAN TREE SPARROWS** have started to arrive, with sightings at Eloika Lake (TL), Sprague Lake (JI); and Kootenai NWR (JI).

Two **LAPLAND LONGSPURS** were sighted near the summit of Mt Spokane (TL); Sprague, WA (JI); Sheep Lake (MC); and the Clark Fork River delta (CL).

A **SNOW BUNTING** was found in early October on the south Feryn property (Peone Wetlands) (TL). It seems a bit early for these guys, so maybe we will have a great winter for them!

Last, but not least, a **PINE GROSBEAK** was spotted at Mt. Spokane (TL) and Iller Creek (CM).



# November 23, Saturday Douglas Plateau Northern Visitors Trip Leader: Kim Thorburn

The Waterville Plateau is a challenging but high-quality destination for rarities during the late fall and winter months. We will work the rolling steppe of the Plateau in search of unusual raptors, owls, and passerines and also bird along the Columbia River in hopes of finding rare Arctic Gulls and saltwater waterfowl, such as scoters, Long-tailed Duck, and Pacific Loon. If attendees are interested, we will spend the night of November 22 in Brewster for an earlier start with the birds during this short daylight season. Contact Kim Thorburn (465-3025 or kthorburn@msn.com) by November 16 if you plan to attend.

Note: This trip will be dependent on weather and road conditions.

Target Birds: Loons and grebes; scoters and rare wintering waterfowl; wintering raptors; Glaucous, Thayer's, and Glaucous-winged Gulls; Snowy Owl; Northern Shrike; Snow Bunting; Lapland Longspur; Gray-crowned Rosy Finch. We will hunt for elusive rarities, including Gyrfalcon and Northern Hawk Owl.



### From West Spokane & South Hill

- I-90 East to Exit 281 toward US-2 E/US-395 N/Newport/ Colville
- Follow US-2 E/US-395 N to E. Mission Ave.
- Turn Right at E. Mission Ave.
- Turn Left at E. Upriver Drive

### From Spokane Valley


- I-90 West to Exit 282A
- Follow N. Hamilton St. to E. Mission Ave.
- Turn Right at E. Mission Ave.
- Turn Left at E. Upriver Drive

### From North Spokane

- Take US-395 S to E. Mission Ave.

- Turn Left at E. Upriver Drive

## Once you're on E. Upriver Drive (see map below):

- Follow E. Upriver to Drive to N. Crestline Street
- Turn Left at N. Crestline Street
- Turn Right on E. North Crescent Drive
